Hello David Chichowski (city of Gardiner, Maine code enforcer)'
The following letter is being sent to you via e-mail and certified mail.
On or about January 2, 2006 a building and demolition permit application package sent via certified mail was sent to the City of Gardiner Code enforcer Waldo Gilpatrick and nine 9 city of Gardiner Officials, return receipts were signed for as proof positive that said officials received it. Said city officials have failed to act on said application permits and in addition to this have ignored the entire application process, therefore violating several city of Gardiner ordinances.

1. Administration Appeals General page 4-7 "all appeals shall be based upon the written decision of the code enforcement officer"

2. Administration Building or use permit page 4-5 "Within 14 days of the filing of an application for a building or use permit, the code enforcer shall approve, deny or refer to the planning board for site plan review, all such applications"

Do you David P. Chichowski, code enforcement officer of the city of Gardiner, Maine, Kennebec County, understand these above statements as City of Gardiner ordinance and do you understand that you are required by state law as well to enforce and to comply to said city ordinances and state of Maine law. Do you knowingly and intentionally refuse to process said building permit application?

If you refuse to process said applications, you may be summoned as a material witness in superior court action against the city.

The Kobrock memoranda dated June 10, 2004 is not an ordinance, the city has no such ordinance. The said memoranda does not override city ordinances nor does it replace a city ordinance. You need to issue those permits or you will be involved in this lawsuit against the city. Read the ordinance manual please. You are responsible for your own actions. If your employer tells you to break laws, are you going to do it?
